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2025 Annual Meeting

January 19, 2025 Minutes

The Annual Meeting of St. Matthias' Episcopal Church was called to order by Senior Warden Donald C. Williams, following the service of Holy Eucharist on January 19, 2025. Donald thanked all those involved for preparing the Annual Report. The Rev. Brenda S. Overfield opened the meeting with prayer. Br. Mark Jenkins was appointed recording secretary for the annual meeting.

The minutes of the 2024 Annual Meeting were approved as submitted.

Donald thanked the staff, Vestry, parishioners and commission heads for their hard work this past year.

Donald introduced John Vance as the incoming Senior Warden and Debbie Thompson as the new Junior Warden.

The nominees for vestry were introduced. These were Kathy Greatwood, Jeff Burke and Gary Hershner.

The nominations were opened to the floor and without any additional nominations, members of the congregation elected Kathy Greatwood, Jeff Burke and Gary Hershner by acclamation.

The Rector's Report to the Annual Parish Meeting was given verbally by the Rev. Brenda S. Overfield. (This report can be found on pages 3-4 in the 2024 Annual Report.)

Senior Warden presented his Annual Report to the Parish citing highlights of the previous year. (This report can be found on pages 4-5 in the 2024 Annual Report.)

The financial report was given by Buck Flournoy presented the financial report (insert of the 2022 Annual Report). Buck thanked the Finance Committee for their support of the financial processes at St. Matthias'.

Donald introduced current members of the Vestry, Julie Noyes, Rodger Hardy, Bill Fraker, Ed Ellis, Donald Williams introduced the candidates standing for vestry, Jeff Burke, Debbie Thompson, John Vance and Linda Seamster.

John Vance and Donald Williams gave an overview of the old transition process and an overview of the new process with a discernment committee. Donald gave an overview of the two processes for searching for a new priest, Time Certain & Interim. Donald announced that the Vestry had voted to proceed with the full interim process for calling a new priest. It was also announced that the parish would have a fulltime interim priest during the discernment process.

The floor was opened to the congregation for a question-and-answer session.

It was asked who would be here before the arrival of the Interim Rector; Brenda answered that supply clergy would be used during the period that an interim search process is conducted.

Ed Mazur expressed his love for this parish and noted the empty seats of the many parishioners that have moved on to their eternal reward.

Bill Oglesby asked for a general timeline for the discernment process; John answered that it would take a year to eighteen months.

It was asked where the interim will come from. Brenda answered that interims are specially trained for that ministry and that the diocese would give the Vestry a list of potential candidates to select from. She also noted that an interim cannot be called the Rector.

Nancy Matthews stated that interims are good for parishes.

It was asked if there is a current search for a Director of Formation. Brenda stated that there is not much interest in this type of position. Brenda stated that the Children's formation continues to function and may even be functioning better than it has in previous years with paid staff. Brenda noted that the process for searching for a Director of Formation has been put on hold until a new Rector is called.

Julie Morrison thanked those who are involved in our Children's Formation.

Julie Noyes noted that many of our Sunday School teachers are former teachers.

Julie Noyes stated that the congregation should be made aware of what the Vestry is doing.

John Vance acknowledged the outgoing Vestry members, Julie Noyes, Donald Williams and Curry Nelms.

John Vance asked that those who may be interested in being a Delegate to Annual Convention may contact Br. Mark.

The Rev. Brenda S. Overfield installed the 2025 Vestry.

With no further business, the Annual Meeting was adjourned.

Interim Rector's Annual Report for 2025



My ministry with St. Matthias' Episcopal Church began on Easter Tuesday, April 22, 2025. For this occasion, I will offer a brief reflection on several strengths of the parish.

Joy: This parish exudes joy! I have experienced your joy in many moments and places: In worship and making music together, in passing the Peace and in fellowship in the Commons and Morrison Hall, in serving in the Food Pantry, ministering in the Sunday School, and even in coming together in grief for a service of Christian burial. Joy is a sign of Christ in our midst. It is a mark of vital ministry and an indication that people have a sense of purpose which is productive and meaningful for them. It can't be manufactured. Joy is inspired by the Holy Spirit.

Warmth: The best indicator of the spiritual health of a congregation is warmth (which is different from mannered friendliness). I can confirm the comments I have heard from visitors: there is genuine warmth among the members of this community, who cherish each other and welcome newcomers. People receive each other as a gift from God. A visitor will be approached by several members of the congregation, who will hold out their hands in friendship and express their interest in the newcomer. This warmth is shared among the generations. Being a smaller congregation is actually an asset in this respect. Bigger is not necessarily better. We need and depend on each other for the flourishing of our ministries and growing in faith, hope and love.

Curiosity: This parish is blessed by the leadership of mature Christians. Their discipleship reflects a strong culture of Christian formation for all ages. This is especially true of the adult Christian formation program, which provides a remarkable number of small group ministries for a parish of this size. These ministries have helped to form in people the leadership quality of curiosity, which I would define as delighting in learning new things, creativity in facing challenges, openness to imaging new possibilities for the future, appreciation for the assets already in hand, and prayerfulness for discerning Christ's call to this parish for a new season of mission.

As I look to the new calendar year of mission together, I would lift up the opportunity for building from these strengths in order to respond the challenge of welcoming newcomers, involving them in the ministries of the church, and developing them as leaders. Small groups are the accelerator for spiritual growth. They spark joy, generate warmth and inspire curiosity; they strengthen commitment and energize new initiatives. I see a special need to create opportunities for adults to participate in Christian formation ministries on days and times that are more convenient for people who are active in the workforce. I perceive that there is a hunger that is not being met by the current menu of adult formation opportunities. To address this deficit, I would ask the Vestry to form a membership committee to invite, welcome and connect new and inactive members; and to form an adult formation committee to create more opportunities for people whose schedules are constrained by their work schedules and childcare responsibilities.

The mission of the church might be described in simple terms: **We try to live and love like Jesus and help others to do the same.** May the Holy Spirit give us the mind of Christ that we may faithfully respond to the opportunities given to us and serve the people whom God has placed in our lives. May it be so. Amen.

Senior Warden's Report

Greg Bezilla as our Interim who arrived the Sunday after Easter.

There were other changes as well. We had tears of sadness as we lost parishioners and held memorial services. We had tears of joy as we celebrated events such as John Murdock's 20 years with St. Matthias'. We enjoyed the renewal of Friday Cheers and the Fall BBQ, and the development of new and exciting programs like Wisdom Over Fear which is attended by both people in our congregation and by those who visit and are welcomed into meaningful group discussions.

As you can see there have been many events and continual change over this past year. Yet, as I look back, I can see that change was not the constant at all. The only constant was grace. Grace has been present with every change and every event. Grace has guided us to where we are today and will guide us as we grow into the future. Grace is the constant that makes up the essence of St. Matthias' and will be with us always.

Now it is time for me to be a part of the change, but as I step down from being Senior Warden and part of the Vestry, I know that grace will guide someone, unknown as I write this, to fill these roles, as well as Junior Warden and other new members of the Vestry. Grace will be with them, as I felt it was with me. I pray that the new Vestry treasures their season and "I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus..." (1 Corinthians 1:4 NRSV) I pray we all continue to live into the grace God has freely given us at St. Matthias'.

WEB:

- Gave our Website a significant facelift.

- Discovered that the church had never deleted its streaming archive from sermon.net. This was costing the church upwards of \$100.00 a month in overflow storage(presumably for years) as compared to \$35.00 a month for Sermon.net.
- Created print out for Sunday Speakers instructing them on how far they should stand from the microphone. This immediately helped and was highly effective.

PRINT MEDIA:

- I did away with the Connecting the Community book and instead created new pamphlets with evergreen information intended for new and prospective church members.
- Created St. Matthias' flyers for the church and the Food Pantry.
- Various Banners.
- Office Hours and Food Pantry Hours graphics.
- Food Pantry Table Runner for pop-up tent.

MISCELLANEOUS:

- Created and provided St. Matthias' t-shirts for the parish.
- Obtained a public performance license to show movies legally at the church for Sunday School.
- Procured a new wireless microphone for the Nave which improves access for people who are unable to get up on the podium.
- Procured cable management ties for the microphones in the naeve.
- Initiated church popup tent at the farmers' market.
- Procured an XLR to 1/4 inch microphone adapter for our mobile speakers.
- Captured various event pictures and videos.
- Refreshed St. Matthias' Logo with a sleeker look which corresponds with the Episcopal Church's Intellectual Property Guidelines. It has significantly higher resolution than the previous logo.

The Chancel Choir presented the "O Come, Lord Jesus, Come" – an Advent Lessons and Carols on Sunday, December 21, during the 10:30 a.m. worship service. Our Annual Holiday Brunch was held after the service.

The organ is in good shape. However, there are several dead notes that are continuing to be a problem. Our organ technician Chris Bono is putting together a proposal of what needs to be repaired, and an estimate of cost.

The Sanctuary piano was tuned two times this year. The piano tuner, John Poliquin of Midlothian Pianos keeps telling me what a great piano we have.

The Music Room piano was tuned two times this year.

Both pianos have Dampchaser units installed to help regulate the humidity level inside each of the pianos.

COMMITTEE/MINISTRY: Adult Education: Wednesday Morning Kerygma

ACHIEVEMENTS: 1. Our group meets in Morrison Hall Wednesday mornings 10:00-11:30 a.m., for a total of about 32 sessions from September to May. 2. We offer a wide range of both sacred and secular classes. 3. Our group is primarily in-person, (however, we offer attendance via ZOOM). 4. We have a planning group of six persons who rotate leadership of classes.

CHALLENGES: 1. Our classes are well advertised, but since we meet during the day, our attendance is limited to mostly retired people. 2. Planning classes are challenging since we develop our own curriculum, but we seek out recommendations from the other adult education groups as well as our own members.

STATISTICS: Our attendance fluctuated from 10 to 15 persons per class. See "Achievements" above for additional statistics.

COMMITTEE/MINISTRY: Adult Formation: Men's Group

ACHIEVEMENTS: 1) With the exception of a few holiday weeks, the group met the entire year; 2) We provided opportunities for men to attend either on-line via ZOOM, or in the church library; 3) We offered

instruction from both religious books and from Holy Scripture; 4) We combined religious instruction with social opportunities by having breakfast after class; 5) Classes were led on a rotational basis among six different men thereby insuring different points of view.

CHALLENGES: It is sometimes difficult to offer both in-person and on-line classes due to the shortage of men available to open the church and operate ZOOM technology. This requires a large degree of teamwork and schedule flexibility. Choosing material can be challenging so we obtain suggestions from the Kerygma groups as well as our members.

STATISTICS: The combined average attendance - on-line and in-person - each week is 10 men. See "Achievements" above for additional statistics.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

Monday Kerygma meets every Monday afternoon year-round at 1:30 pm in one of the classrooms. We all participate equally as a group instead of having a dedicated leader. We sometimes use traditional Bible studies and sometimes we do religious book studies. We read our lessons/books together as a group, which enables us to stop when someone has something to discuss or has a question. By reading the book/lesson together in class the material stays fresh in our minds for discussion. It's informal but works well for us as it's a wonderful way to hear others' opinions and perspectives on what we are studying. Listed below are some of our favorite books/studies we did in 2025. In December, we always do an Advent study and readings.

CHALLENGES:

We haven't really had any challenges. The one thing that we did change recently is our starting and ending time. We changed our time from 2:00-4:00 p.m. to 1:30-3:30 p.m. We did this because two or three people need to leave the class to start pre-packing for Food Pantry for Monday night. We unanimously agreed that it wouldn't be a problem for us to meet and end 30 minutes earlier so those individuals could stay for the whole class.

COMMITTEE/MINISTRY: Communications

The Committee was formed in the first quarter of 2022. In July of this year Kathy Greatwood passed the leadership of the Committee over to Travis Summerville, the Communications and Media Specialist Staff member. Zita Barre and Mary Pearrell served on the Committee part of the year. Other members of the commission now include Zach Lowe, Bill Oglesby and Julie Noyes. Debbie Thompson has also served on this commission from the Vestry.

The Communications Committee works to support and respond to the direction of the Media and Communications Specialist on staff. This Committee helps guide and support parish communications, providing ideas and executing them.

Functions / Responsibilities of the Committee include:

- Assisting with emergency notifications and crisis communications.
- Live-streaming, sound, and global broadcast of our worship.
- Maintaining the church's exterior marquee (Huguenot Road) messaging.
- Scheduling and writing member and ministry spot-lights for our eNews.
- Promoting digital engagement and encouraging volunteer involvement in media efforts.
- Organizing and staffing our Community Engagement Team's pop-up tent.
- Monitoring the website for information in need of updating.

Our Communications and Media Specialist, Travis Somerville oversees the planning, creation, and distribution of internal and external communications for St. Matthias'. His Responsibilities include.

- Developing and executing our communications strategy (print, digital, social media).
- Managing the website, electronic newsletter (eNews), and social media platforms.

- Producing graphics, videos, and photography to support ministries, programs, and campaigns.
- Collaborating with ministry leaders to ensure timely announcements, event promotion, and storytelling.
- Ensuring brand consistency and church identity across all communications channels.
- Monitoring and evaluating engagement metrics to continuously improve our outreach.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

Livestream-stable now with four current members for the late service and two members for the early service. Travis Somerville also occasionally will oversee this ministry during services.

Julie Noyes and Bill Ogelsby continue to write the bi-monthly Member Spotlight articles.

Mark Jenkins, Curry Nelms, Kathy Greatwood and Debbie Thompson are trained to send emergency texts to church members.

Connecting to the Community booklet has been eliminated and replaced with a trifold pamphlet which was created by Travis Somerville.

In order to educate the general membership on what the Vestry does, the “Vestry Times” were written by the Junior Warden and submitted and added to eNews and church bulletin.

Julie Noyes updated our bulletin boards in aesthetically pleasing ways throughout the year.

St. Matthias’ was represented at the Robious/Huguenot Rd, Farmer’s Market in September, October and November this year. By being present, we hope to create a positive first impression of St. Matthias’ that encourages people to take the next step when they are ready.

CHALLENGES:

Schedule for changing the front sign still needs to be completed for 2026.

Website updates continue and a link has been added to St. Matthias’ webpage to submit requested changes.

Finding volunteers to represent St. Matthias’ at Farmer’s Market monthly.

We need more people to volunteer for the soundboard at both services.

KAIROS

The support St. Matthias' provides through prayer, cookie baking, use of the campus for meetings, and most especially financially for this ministry is a blessing to the volunteers and the incarcerated in Virginia prisons. St. Matthias' support for Kairos volunteers aided in two four-day weekends, two one-day retreats and twelve monthly Reunions and Prayer and Share meetings at Central Virginia Correctional Unit (CVCU). Grace and blessing abound as we work together in the building of God's Kingdom. We are grateful for your support.

LOIS HARRISON-JONES ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

St. Matthias' provides Tutors, Classroom Assistants and First Friday Readers for Lois Harrison-Jones Elementary School, a Richmond City Public School. We presently have seven active volunteers who are busy throughout the year supporting the children and staff at Harrison-Jones Elementary. We also support the school with gifts. In May during Teacher Appreciation week, we provided a Celebrate Our Teachers Luncheon for all of the staff. In August we requested donations from the congregation for teacher supplies for the three kindergarten classes and the three first grade classes to help start the new school year off right. We also had a Welcome Back Breakfast for all the staff in August. Several times during the year we provided popcorn and fruit juice for 150 students recognized for outstanding attendance. In December we gave the 284 students at Harrison-Jones Elementary a book along with a pencil and a candy cane for Christmas. Being a part of the lives of those at Harrison-Jones Elementary is a true gift to each of us that volunteer there.

ST. MATTHIAS' FOOD PANTRY

"Just say yes", she said and it will happen. And it did! The Food Pantry has had a huge impact on our church and our community. Each week the Food Pantry is open on Monday evenings and Thursday mornings for folks to get food from the Pantry. Volunteers pack bags with a week's worth of food for each family. Not only do our parishioners donate food but other churches, organizations and stores in our community make donations. This year has been our busiest year helping our neighbors with food (141,156 meals through November – a 24% increase over 2024). Many more families are being helped, and many more volunteers are helping make this happen. The blessings just keep coming

SHELTER FEEDING

In 2025 St. Matthias' members provided 994 lunches to four downtown shelters: Good Samaritan men's shelter, Liberation Veteran's Services men's shelter, Home Again women and children shelter and Salvation Army men's shelter. The challenge in 2026 is to provide more lunches as the need has increased.

Our church partners with St. Martin's Episcopal, Manakin Episcopal, Lyndell Baptist, Second Branch Baptist, St. Andrew's Episcopal, and All Saints Episcopal which delivers the fifth Saturday of each calendar year. Thanks to all who pack lunches and make the shelter feeding possible.

Children and Youth Formation

The Sunday school year was January 2025 through December 2025 with a 3 month break in the summer. Sunday school hours are 10:15 a.m. until approximately 11:10 a.m. when they join their family in the church for communion. This year we had four separate classes; PreK-1st grade, 2nd-5th grade, 6th-8th grade, and 9th-12th grade. We had 21 children registered with an average attendance of 15. The following activities were part of our Sunday school calendar: Burying the Alleluias, Easter Egg Hunt, All Saints' Sunday program for the congregation, Heifer Project, and the Christmas Eve Pageant.

The nursery is available every Sunday all year. Our paid attendant, Allie Sears, is there from 10:00 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. Allie has a qualified volunteer from the congregation assist her in the classroom each week. We have 1 or 2 children per week.

During the summer months we offer a children's program for PreK-5th grade. The hours for this program are 10:30 a.m.- 12:00 p.m.

In July 2025 we held our first VBS since the loss of a formation leader. We had 10 children and 15 volunteers. All supplies were provided by the congregation.

We focused on getting a youth group started. A meeting was held in September between parents, youth, and Junior and senior high school Sunday school teachers. Ideas

for service projects, fun activities, and educational opportunities were discussed. We started with The Crop Walk on November 9. We have planned a variety of spiritual movies for the Sunday afternoons in the winter/spring that will include pizza and soda. Additional service projects are being researched as well as a possible mission trip in 2026. We are also looking into more organized activities such as: Top Golf, a retreat at the beach, Shrine Mont, or Camp Chanco.

Discernment Committee

COMMITTEE/MINISTRY: St. Matthias' Discernment Committee

ACHIEVEMENTS: The St. Matthias' Discernment Committee was formed by the Vestry and began meeting in late March. The Committee has worked closely with the Director of the Office of Transition Ministry (OTM) as we follow the Diocesan process for discernment and search. Through early December, the Committee has held 14 full committee meetings, including a day-long Saturday session with the Director of OTM, as well as completing work assignments between meetings.

Among the milestones met thus far are the crafting of a guiding Discernment Prayer for our Committee, and for all Parish activities. Also, the Committee developed, administered and analyzed a parish-wide survey to best describe the congregation's perceptions of the identity of St. Matthias'. These insights were indispensable in the development of our Community Ministry Portfolio (CMP), previously known as the Parish Profile.

Most recently, we completed the comprehensive Community Ministry Portfolio, which utilizes the survey results and other information to describe St. Matthias' to those clergy members who are considering a call to a new ministry. This portfolio will be posted on a special national Episcopal Church network by the OTM, and those clergy who are interested will respond. Following a review by the OTM, the Discernment Committee will begin interviewing prospective compatible candidates in order to select and present a candidate to the Vestry.

Healing Prayer

Achievements:

The Healing Prayer Ministry is a special ministry for me and the others who are healing prayer ministers. We feel the ministry is growing in the number of people who come asking for prayer each week. After Rev. Greg explained more about the ministry in the announcements in church, the numbers have grown, sometimes significantly. Challenges:

Stewardship

Stewardship Commission Annual Report – 2025

How we see Stewardship: We are grateful, responsible stewards of the gifts we receive from God. To the Church, stewardship is more than simply contributing money. For example, when we participate with St. Matthias' ministries, we are also contributing our time and our talents to our church.

This year the Stewardship Committee utilized materials from **TENS – The Episcopal Network for Stewardship**. The theme for this year was '**Tell Out My Soul**'. Working within this theme, we had six speakers give testimonials about their own personal experiences with Stewardship. Additionally, email letters were sent to the congregation from the Interim Rector and the Senior Warden.

Supporting our Stewardship Campaign, we utilized **TENS**'s logo graphics, promotional buttons, and banner. The hymn "Tell Out My Soul" was also incorporated into services at St. Matthias'.

Another new feature of the 2026 Stewardship campaign was the use of digital technology and media. Parishioners were able to use the St. Matthias' website to make their Estimates of Giving online. Weekly e-News was used for updates and as a reminder to encourage prompt returning of Estimates of Giving statements. This year we also added the ability to volunteer for ministries on the Estimate of Giving statement.

The results of these efforts were very positive: St. Matthias' received 115 Estimates of Giving statements, which was more than we received in the previous year. The estimates for financial support for 2026 were also greater than in previous year's commitments.

To manage parishioners' contributions, there are three Giving Categories:

- **General Fund:** St. Matthias' operational fund for immediate ministerial costs, overhead, ongoing maintenance. This is our primary source of funding for the ongoing work of the church.
- **Community Ministries:** Funds for our various outreach ministries (Food Pantry, Fellowship, Micah Project, Christmas Mother, etc.)
- **Blessing Gifts:** Gifts given by individuals who want to share their blessings in addition to their General Fund or Community Ministries

Everything that St. Matthias' has been able to do this year is because of the generous gifts of our church family. Besides financial contributions, the generosity of parishioner's time and talents make our ministries the successes that they are. All our services, facilities and ministries are only possible through everyone's generosity. St. Matthias' will thrive in the future because we support our church today.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

- Prepared and recommended a financial budget for Vestry approval.
- Prepared, reviewed and recommended the annual audit to the Vestry.
- Reviewed montly P&L and Balance Sheet reports to track potential challenges.
- Provided input to vestry regarding large or unbudgeted expenditures

CHALLENGES:

- With the continued erosion in the number of annual family pledging units, our ability to fulfill our mission in a declining revenue stream continues to be challenging.
- The preperation and completion of the annual financial audit totalling in excess of 50 pages of analysis is challenging due to small committee.

STATISTICS:

- Stewardship team did a remarkable job and allows an increase of \$15,000 of expected revenue for the 2026 budget. The current 2026 proposed budget will draw on reserves \$30,000 and still show a loss of \$18,000.
- Expenses in 2025 will be roughly \$24,000 more than income plus we utilized reserves to accomodate some of the shortfall.
- Current reserves and endowment total \$286,000.

The LEMs' Subcommittee Annual Report for 2025 by Nat Wooding:



We currently have 21 persons serving as LEMs. During the year, one member had to drop out and a former LEM returned. Also, a new church member is in the process of being licensed. Of these 22 people, seven attend the early service.

During the year, we have experimented with several scenarios for the early service and finally settled on the scheme of having two people serve. One reads the first lesson and leads the Psalm and serves as the chalicer. The other functions as a lector, does not have to vest, and reads the second lesson and leads the prayers of the people. This scheme reduces the number of Sundays that our few early service LEMs need to serve and, if they are the lector, lets them serve in that capacity and as the healing minister. I don't think that anyone is also serving as a greeter or usher, but this would let them do double duty.

The second service continues with three LEMs (one bread and two chalicer).

Several of the acolytes have agreed to be licensed as LEMs so that if we come up short, there will be someone to assist at communion. This also allows those who only want to serve as lectors to serve, and the acolyte can handle communion.
